## International Observe the Moon Night 2020

On September 26, 2020, hundreds of thousands of people around the world participated in <u>International Observe the Moon Night</u>, an annual worldwide public engagement program that encourages observation, appreciation, and understanding of our Moon and its connection to planetary science and exploration.

- 3,775 events and observers registered worldwide (doubled 2019 registration)
- moon.nasa.gov went from #39 to #14 among NASA's most-visited websites for September
- @NASAMoon shared content with 339K followers and had 3.26M impressions in September
  - **14,227** #ObserveTheMoon tweets worldwide in September
  - NASA scientists, engineers, and outreach professionals conducted 63 media interviews including 11 in Spanish on 9/25 and answered #AskNASA questions during the event's official NASA TV broadcast on 9/26
  - A live broadcast on September 26<sup>th</sup> streamed on NASA TV, Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, and Twitch. The archived show on the NASA YouTube channel has **250,000+** views and 68K views on Twitch.
